Jonah 1

This summer we are considering stories from the Old Testament and their abiding relevance today. As you study the passage, look beyond your notes to glean more truth from this passage by using these questions, so that you can find a greater harvest of truth!

Context: Jonah is the first prophet to speak directly to the people rather than the king. See 2 Kings 14:23-29 for the context of the life of Jonah.

Observation: Which details stand out to as you read about the call and response of Jonah?

Meaning: Where do you see the sovereignty of God in this passage, and his compassion for the lost of this world? What does this book teach us about obedience?

Application: How does Jonah challenge the hypocrisy in our hearts? How can you grow in the same kind of broad and deep love that God has for the lost?
