

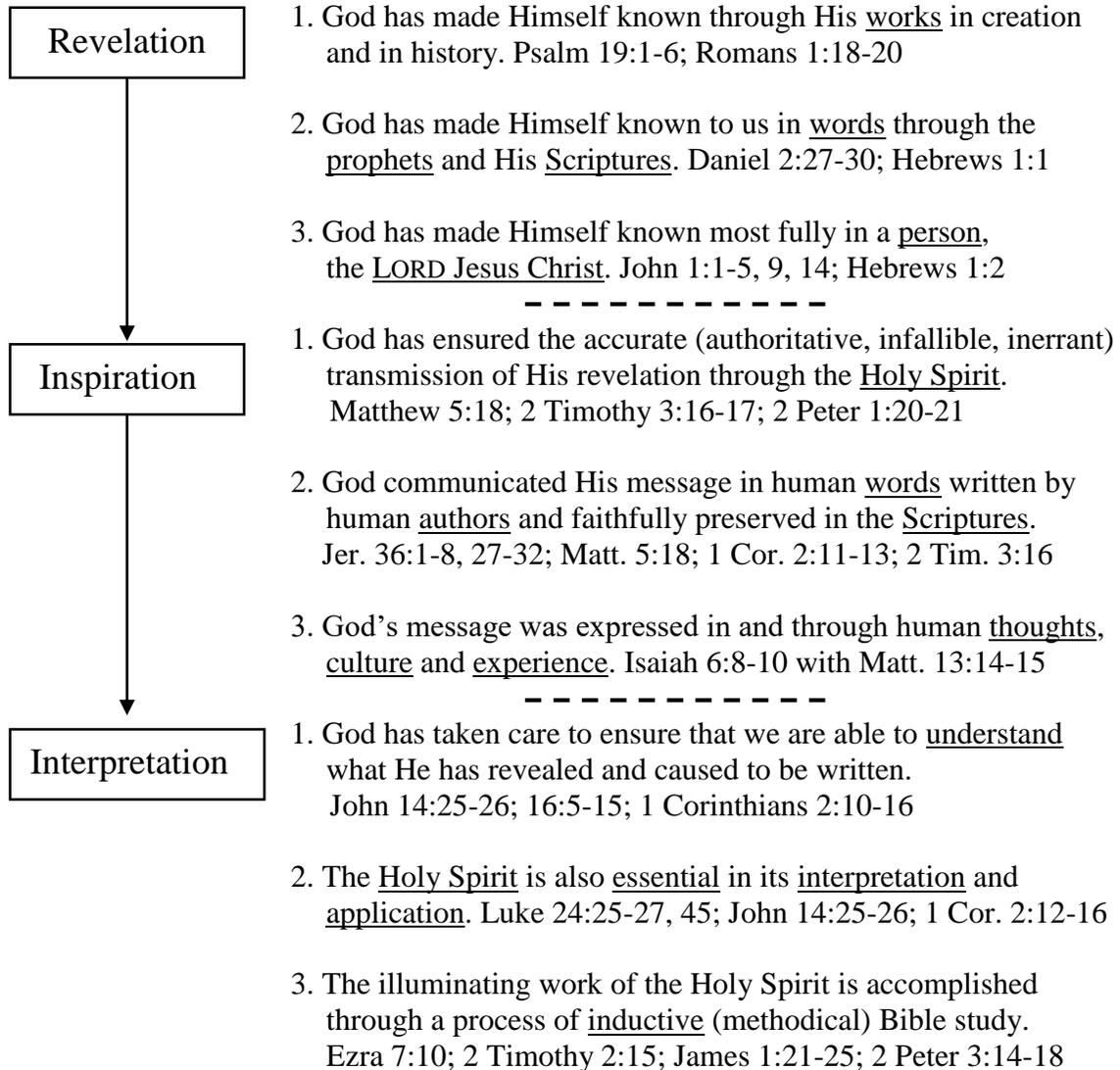
# How to Study the Bible

### The Savior and the Scripture: God's gifts of love



Revelation = Truth is revealed (by the Holy Spirit, a perfect process)

Inspiration = Truth is recorded (by the Holy Spirit, a perfect process)

Illumination = Truth is received (personal study, an imperfect process)

### **Developing a “seeing eye.”**

Three people came to the tomb on resurrection Sunday morning. All three “saw” the tomb, but not all “saw” the same thing.

1. How did their “seeing” at the tomb compare or differ?
2. How did their response to what they “saw” compare or differ?

#### **John 20:1-9**

Now on the first day of the week Mary Magdalene came to the tomb early, while it was still dark, and saw that the stone had been taken away from the tomb. <sup>2</sup> So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, “They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.” <sup>3</sup> So Peter went out with the other disciple, and they were going toward the tomb. <sup>4</sup> Both of them were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. <sup>5</sup> And stooping to look in, he saw the linen cloths lying there, but he did not go in. <sup>6</sup> Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen cloths lying there, <sup>7</sup> and the face cloth, which had been on Jesus’ head, not lying with the linen cloths but folded up in a place by itself. <sup>8</sup> Then the other disciple, who had reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; <sup>9</sup> for as yet they did not understand the Scripture, that he must rise from the dead. (ESV)
